## Setting the scene

With the help of our friends, we have recently supported four theatre events for deaf and hard of hearing children which have been organised by Mousetrap Theatre Projects.

Two events were built around the musical *School of Rock* with 60 children taking part. A further 157 children attended performances of *Romeo and Juliet* at The Globe. Each event included a pre-show drama workshop exploring the story and

its characters and themes, an onstage tour and a matinee performance which was either British Sign Language interpreted or captioned.

'The workshop was fantastic because it was so interactive and personal,' said one teacher. 'Everything was broken down and pitched at the right level, and motivated every child to get involved. The communication needs were met and the students loved that humour was used.'

### Reaching out to families

We are delighted to be working with The Elizabeth Foundation again, contributing towards their Let's Listen and Talk programme for deaf children from 0-5 years.

The online, interactive programme helps parents support their child in developing listening, speaking and communication skills, and is designed to reach and help families who live far from the charity's Hampshire headquarters.

## 'A fabulous experience'

This spring, children and young people from across the country have taken part in sports days supported by OHF.



The swimming and boccia tournaments, which were organised by sports charity Panathlon, brought students together to have fun and develop their strength and social confidence.

Panathlon's events have been described as, 'a fabulous experience for deaf children who can often feel isolated.' One teacher from Hertfordshire talked about the benefits: 'Students enjoy the competitive nature of events which is good for their overall development, and they also teach them transferable skills such as respect, team work, communication and leadership.'

A teacher from Yorkshire said the events broke down barriers between deaf and hearing children: 'Doing this gives them that extra confidence to go out and play sport with the hearing pupils. It gives them the belief in themselves that they can participate in sporting activities.'



### Another 'Outstanding' year!

Once again, we were delighted to support The Ear Foundation's most recent Outdoor Activities Challenge in the Derbyshire Dales.

The summer residential brought 31 children and young people together for five days of climbing, canoeing and abseiling. The activities holiday focused on developing skills and friendships and the effective use of hearing technology. One young person said: 'I felt more independent and free – it helps me focus more on my responsibilities.' Another teenager added: 'I feel very proud of being deaf and that I am to communicate with loads of people.'

Ofsted carried out an inspection and once again awarded it the top rating of '*Outstanding*'.

We look forward to supporting The Ear Foundation in this their 30th year.
