Celebrating community

We are supporting two fantastic projects to bring Deaf children and young people together in London.



Remark! Community runs a weekly youth club in North London. Our grant has supported the appointment of a new coordinator to lead activities. Recent highlights have

included a cookery workshop led by a professional chef in a commercial kitchen, and a tour of Dulwich Picture Gallery from a local Deaf historian. *The club has given the opportunity to many Deaf young people within London to come together, build their social skills, make new friends and feel like they belong within a community,'* said Trustee Jonny Nelson, who is also the founder of the charity.



Natalia, a former Ovingdean Hall School student, is now a support worker at Remark!, while another former student, Victoria, recently delivered an inclusion workshop at the youth club.

We have also helped Remark!'s charity partner Deaf-SELF to deliver their summer play scheme in South East London. 'Your support has gone a long way in allowing us to continue providing our Deaf play scheme, which has now been supporting Deaf children for the past 19 years,' said Annie O'Shea, Treasurer of Deaf-SELF.

Around 60 children and young people participate in the play scheme each summer, with activities including football, arts and crafts, and day trips to the seaside. Sharing Alice's Adventures



We have supported soprano **Charlotte Hoather's project to** bring opera to schools.

Charlotte toured her Alice In Wonderland-inspired opera Down the Rabbit Hole during March 2023, delivering 25 performances across schools in Winsford and

London. Down The Rabbit Hole was written by Charlotte, with music provided by Zollino. Charlotte also wrote and illustrated a guide to accompany the opera.

Fiona Maddocks, writing in The Guardian on 8 April 2023, gave the show a five star review:

The free flow of song, dance, clever piano riffs, mime and sign language absorbed every child present. This tiny enterprise has incalculable resonance.'

'I wanted to create an inclusive and enjoyable opera for both hearing and deaf children,' said Charlotte, who was diagnosed at birth as profoundly deaf in one ear. 'My aim was to remove barriers to classical music caused by access, location or finance and show that anyone can be creative. OHF provided crucial support for this project, and your belief in the idea and generous donation made it possible.'

One student who saw the performance at Frank Barnes Primary School for Deaf Children said it was his, *'favourite show to* watch.'
